Thank You from Pastor Julie



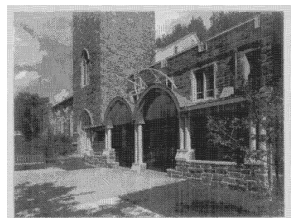

Thoughts from the Pastor



Dear Friends:

I just finished getting a mailing ready to youth entering grades 9-12; it's about the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans in July of 2009. Every three years the ELCA holds one of these gatherings in a major city and over 30,000 young people (and not-so-young people) attend. I've been to six or seven of these events and it is always a life-changing, faith-boosting experience for me.

Imagine worshipping and singing with over 30,000 people in the New Orleans Super Dome!

The theme of the 2009 Gathering is "Jesus + Justice + Jazz," and participants will gather around Word and Sacrament in the birthplace of jazz and home of a rich cultural history. The context of post-Katrina New Orleans will provide us with the opportunity to emphasize the connection between faith in Jesus Christ and the practice of serving.

The Gathering web site describes the five days we will spend in New Orleans in this way:

With Jesus' ministry of servant leadership as the model, young people will learn what it means to be baptized Christians living out God's justice in the world. Like devoted jazz musicians, young people will hone their listening skills as they experience diverse communities, returning home with more finely tuned ears to hear God and others. They will practice using their voice of witness in word and deed to proclaim God's love to the entire world, and will return home with a renewed witness to Jesus Christ that will enliven your whole congregation. That last part — "enliven your whole congregation" — is true. It has been my experience that, in the year leading up to the Gathering and in the years to follow, the whole congregation not only participates in, but benefits from, the zeal and enthusiasm those who go exude. I've even had adults in their thirties who "date" their high school years at church by which Gathering they attended!

I look forward to leading this exciting challenge beginning this September, and I know we can count on the congregation's support.

Stephen Minister Update:



The Journey Continues

I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life. (Revelation 21: 6b)

Our fifty hours of training have come to an end! On June 8 we nine stood before the congregation with a sense of awe and humility, our leaders with us, and were commissioned during the worship service as Stephen Ministers. In the April issue of *The Chimes*, Lisa Lexa Wilson, in her article "The Journey Begins," spoke of the apprehension with which we had approached our training, and thoughtfully posed these questions: "...should we be here? Are we worthy? Will we be able to serve God in this new capacity? Aren't there others more qualified, better suited to do this than we?"

Although I am still unable to answer these questions with absolute certainty, I *do* feel more confident and better prepared to answer this calling as a result of the training we have received. We learned how to deal with very specific situations, such as job loss, the overwhelming feeling of being a new parent, chronic illness, loneliness caused by a move to a new town or a nursing facility, and the "big three" situations that we found so difficult to consider: grief (over the loss of many things but especially of a loved one), depression and suicide. We also learned to recognize when we are definitely *not* qualified to give the professional help needed by our care receiver in such situations and how to facilitate referral to someone who *can* give that quality of care.

Besides talking about specific situations, we spent much time learning about the vital principles that gird up the Stephen Ministry program: listening fully and intentionally and reflecting what we hear in subsequent conversation; drawing out our care receiver's feelings in a gentle, compassionate and *completely* nonjudgmental way (displaying unconditional positive regard); offering distinctively Christian caring, using prayer, Scripture and a blessing when it seems appropriate; setting boundaries (being empathetic yet still not so deeply involved that we can't be objective in our assessment and assistance); being assertive when necessary ("speaking the truth in love"); leaving the results to God (the **cure** giver) while we (the **care** givers) walk beside our care receiver during a difficult time; and sometimes just giving a cup of water ("*To the thirsty I will give water...*"). And overarching all of these skills is the assurance to the care receiver of *total confidentiality*, an essential element of the ministry. *(Continued, next page)*

We absorbed all this information and honed our skills in a variety of ways: watching videos; discussion in which we shared our experiences and observations; many (sometimes we thought *too many!*) skill practices (more familiarly known as role play), which we all *hated* in the beginning but actually came to see as an invaluable tool in our training; and, most important, instruction by our wonderful leaders. We can't thank them enough for their commitment of time and energy during their own training and throughout our training. They were all wonderful and each brought something unique to our time together: Beth, her boundless pep, optimism and cheerfulness; Hazel, her calm manner and wry sense of humor that made us laugh frequently and loudly; Toni, her honesty in sharing stories and her amazing PowerPoint presentations; and Pastor Skip, all his wonderful pastoral skills—meticulous preparation and presentation, great sensitivity, perceptive insights and even beautiful piano playing—that are so obvious to everyone in the congregation.

So this is the **end**, but only of the first phase. Now comes a new **beginning** (I always thought that phrase was redundant but in this case it seems appropriate): our ministry to our care receivers and our peer group supervision, in which we meet in small groups to discuss our care giving situations in a completely anonymous way and to give to and receive from each other the support and love that have grown stronger and deeper since we began. For me that's been one of the biggest blessings of this whole experience: forging a loving, caring and supportive bond with our leaders and our fellow Stephen Ministers and knowing that we will all be praying for each other as we embark on this humbling but exciting ministry.

We ask you all, our dear brothers and sisters in Christ, to pray for us too as we continue our journey bearing in mind the points of the caregiver's compass: the call to be trustworthy, skilled, compassionate, and full of faith, with Christ, the source and power of our ministry, at the center.



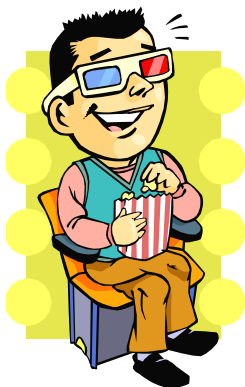
Council Highlights

The Congregation Council met on Thursday, June 5, 2008. Highlights of the meeting are as follows:

- The pastors reported on their attendance at the Synod Assembly in May, the finalization of plans for the upcoming Vacation Bible School program from June 16th to 20th, and the commissioning of our Stephen Minister candidates on Sunday, June 8th. Pastor Julie expressed her deep appreciation for the congregation's June 1st celebration in honor of the 10th anniversary of her ministry at Saint Paul's and her heartfelt thanks for the congregation's spiritual support and generous gifts.
- Upon considering a report and recommendation of the Social Ministry Committee, the Council approved changing the congregation's missionary support to Barbara Robertson, a missionary in Tanzania. The Social Ministry Committee also presented a proposal from Liberty at Home, a service of Liberty Lutheran Services, to host a day program of respite care for adults with early to middle cognitive decline twice per month at Saint Paul's. The Council approved a pilot program of two days per month, contingent upon agreement to guidelines for the use of space to be established through consultation between the Social Ministry and Property Committees.
- The Finance Committee reported that year-to-date congregational giving is four percent under budget and expenditures are seven percent over budget. Budget updates will be provided to the congregation via *The Chimes* and bulletin over the remainder of the year.
- The Property Committee reported that Grace Covenant Church has terminated its lease for our sanctuary and other space on Sunday afternoons because it is seeking worship space for Sunday mornings. The Committee is exploring Grace Covenant's interest in periodically renting space as needed and available. Following minor repairs, the former cemetery caretaker's house has been rented to a new tenant under a one-year lease, renewable month-to-month thereafter. Winslow Stained Glass will begin restoration of the next stained glass window in late June.

Libby Anderson Hoyer, Parish Activities

Where were you born? Where did you grow up?

I was born in Oakland, California, a 4th generation Californian. Because my father was in the U.S. Navy, I attended approximately 16 schools before high school. However, I ended up attending only one high school, in Bethesda, Maryland, and then college on the East Coast (while my father was assigned to Taipei, Taiwan).

How do you spend your days? What is your calling?

I work as a Pediatric Clinical Geneticist at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children. Although I am listed as "Section Chief" of Clinical Genetics, in fact there is only one Clinical Geneticist for the hospital. My job is to try to understand whether there is a genetic basis for children with medical problems. If so, then I am available to speak with the families (along with a part-time Genetic counselor). Families come from such an incredible variety of backgrounds that it can be both challenging and satisfying to try to answer their questions in an appropriate way.

What brought you here? What keeps you here?

The first time I attended a Sunday service at Saint Paul's, Maria Simms happened to be sitting nearby. In addition to offering the Greeting of Peace during the service, Maria chatted after the service in such a welcoming way that it seemed that Saint Paul's might welcome all comers. Such a caring community is something to treasure and be thankful for.

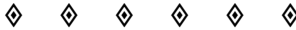
Volunteers Needed for Interfaith Hospitality Network
